Dear Neva.



<u>Just a reminder</u>—The Florence Town Company was formed in September 1870. The ATSF railroad reached Florence May 11, 1871.

Florence was incorporated as a third class city June 12, 1872. T. P. Alexander was the first mayor of Florence. It is the notes from this man's diary that we use to write the early day history of Florence, Kansas.

Good Old Days

NOTES FROM T.P. ALEXANDER DIARY By Neva Robinson

August 20th, 1888-

The electric lights were shut off on account of low water in the river.

A clipping headed "Fire Notes" reads: Mr. Aves sustained a loss of \$2,500.00 He will rebuild. Mrs. Ira Tharp was terribly prostrated by the fire. A lady fainted in front of ye editor's home from fright. A.A. March's blacksmith shop was cleared of nearly everything from an anvil down to a horse shoe. T.P. Alexander furnished the lanterns on that occasion and worked industriously for the preservation of the property. Our water works have advanced above par; closely followed by our gallant hose companies, both were found to be much needed at that time. The streets were well filled with gentle sex and mother hubbards were seen in every direction. Tom Ferro is a dandy man when it comes to managing a fire. A. A. March and Dan Alexander know how to make the boys "squirt" water. The streets in the vicinity of the fire were pretty well crowded with reapers, mowers, buggies and household goods.



FRED NAMED TO KANSAS BUSINESS HALL OF FAME

Neva shares this article taken from the business section of a recent Wichita Eagle.....

The late Fred Harvey, founder of the Harvey House restaurant and hotel chain will be inducted at a ceremony June 17th at Emporia State University in conjunction with the Kansas Calvary encampment. Harvey's chain of restaurants and hotels traced the Santa Fe Railroad's expansion westward in the 1870's. At its peak, this first ever restaurant chain included 84 Harvey Houses. Harvey died in 1901.

I made this casserole for a church dinner recently and it was well received.

Chicken & Rice Casserole
4 C. diced cooked chicken
1 medium onion, diced and sauteed
1 8 oz. can water chestnuts, drained and chopped
2 14 ½ oz. cans French style green beans
1 4 oz. can chopped pimentos, drained
1 10 oz. can condensed cream of celery soup
1 C. mayonnaise

1 6 oz. Uncle Ben's long grain and wild rice cooked according to package directions
1 C. grated cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Mix all ingredients together and pour into a 3 quart casserole. Bake for 30 minutes.

This is an easy recipe and quite tasty. I would use real mayonnaise and sharp cheddar cheese.


HATS OFF TO THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY By Trayce Warner
